Improving Recycling, One Bin at a Time



Pleasantville Public Works and ACUA worked together to inspect bins

The Atlantic County Utilities Authority (ACUA) is connecting with local communities to increase and improve recycling.

Most recently, ACUA joined forces with the Pleasantville Public Works Department to perform curbside inspections at 160 homes in the community. On three recycling days, the team visually inspected curbside bins and recorded incorrect materials placed in recycling. Good job tags were left for those doing well, and educational "oops" tags were given to those needing improvement.

The results provided insights into the average person's recycling habits and valuable feedback to ACUA's outreach team. The number one contaminant found in curbside bins was bagged material.

"Bagged material is particularly bad for recycling sorting equipment," said ACUA Vice President of Solid Waste Gary Conover. "Plastic bags get trapped in equipment, which can cause costly repairs and potential injuries. It's important for residents to keep items loose in their containers."

Leaving informative tags made a big difference. By the end of the project, there was a

55% decrease in bagged material and an overall 30% decrease in "oops" tags issued at the curb.

"Engaging with the community through outreach initiatives like this is essential for the success of recycling in Atlantic County," stated ACUA President Matthew DeNafo. "Recycling offers every resident a simple opportunity to positively impact the environment. It conserves resources, minimizes landfill space, and reduces waste disposal costs."

In addition to the curbside audit, ACUA distributed an educational mailer, performed presentations to community groups, and distributed recycling bags to residents living in multi-family homes, which provides an easy way for residents to transport recycling material into communal dumpsters.

Girl-Powered AI Recycling Chatbot Wins State Recognition

There's nothing artificial about the intelligence of four local high school students that created an award-winning Recycling Chatbot.

Students Krispa Chapagain, Christina Htay, Sapna Patel, and Emily Liang of Mainland Regional High School recently developed an award-winning Al Recycling Chatbot that helps connect younger students with environmental projects as part of their STEM for Change Club.

"Our goal was to develop a sustainability focused chatbot app that would motivate students to reuse recycling materials," said Chapagain.

The bot prompts users to search for materials and guides them to a corresponding reuse project. For example, a search of paper generates instructions on how to make seed starters from old newspapers.

The group showcased their project at the statewide STEAM Tank Challenge hosted by the New Jersey School Boards Association where they placed in the top ten and took home a \$500 prize. The challenge invites students to develop solutions to environmental or societal issues impacting our communities.

LANDFILL UPDATES

Permanent Cap Project Ongoing

Work to install a permanent cap over 16 acres of the ACUA's landfill in Egg Harbor Township is ongoing.

A permanent cap is a common tool that gets applied to areas of a landfill that are no longer accepting waste. The cap will block water from entering the landfill and prevent the creation of leachate. The cap will also prevent air and water from entering the landfill gas collection system, which will ensure it operates efficiently.

The \$7 million project is being completed five years ahead of schedule thanks to the

support of the Atlantic County Executive and Commissioners who approved an appropriation from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The cap construction began in April and is expected to be finished in the fall.

Renewable Natural Gas Facility Opening Soon

The renewable natural gas (RNG) facility that has been under construction since October 2023 is nearing completion.

The facility will capture and clean gases naturally created from decaying waste in the landfill. Once scrubbed to pipeline quality, the gas will be fed through the existing South Jersey Gas infrastructure as an energy source for the community. The project, the first of its kind in the state, will transform gas that would otherwise go wasted into a clean energy source.

The RNG facility is expected to be operational in September. Visit acua.com for updates.

5 Easy Ways to Improve Your Recycling

- Give your containers a quick rinse.

 Food and liquids should be removed before placing items in your bin.
- 2. Keep items loose in the container. Do not place items in a bag.
- Check the bottom of your plastics for numbers 1, 2 or 5.
- When it comes to glass, think bottles and jars no mirrors or dishes.

PUMP STATION RENEWAL

BEFORE

The Atlantic County Utilities Authority (ACUA) operates 20 pump stations across the county that transport dirty water from sinks, toilets and washing machines to the Wastewater Treatment Plant in Atlantic City.

The Downbeach Pump Station located in Ventnor, originally constructed in the 1970s, recently underwent a \$5.3 million revitalization that provided much-needed upgrades to its structural, electrical, and operational components.

The station works around the clock to transport nearly three million gallons of wastewater each day from Longport, Margate, Ventnor, and Seaview Harbor to ACUA's Wastewater Treatment Facility in Atlantic City.



UPGRADES INCLUDED:

Wet Well Expansion + Repair

The wet well, which acts as a holding tank for wastewater, was doubled in size to handle large volumes of water during major storm events. The existing wet well was also repaired, and a protective coating was added.

New HVAC System

The heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system was fully replaced to be more reliable and energy efficient.

New Electrical Components

The electric transformer amperage was increased, and the station's automatic transfer switch, main distribution switchboard, and incoming power feed were replaced.

Permanent Bypass Added

This ensures sewage can bypass the station during maintenance or emergencies.

Protective Coatings

Protective coatings were added to all pipes in the dry well area of the pump station.

New Roof, Cedar Shakes, Paving and Fencing

The roof and cedar shakes were replaced, a new fence was installed, and repaving was completed to improve the site's structure and appearance.


The charts below show rates for local drinking water as well as the sewer and wastewater treatment rates based on 70,000 gallons/year usage.


